Welcome to our Autumn newsletter. We've been busy bees at Keycomm, so inside you'll learn about some of the changes to the service, our new website, our thoughts on the new devices available, and the courses we have on offer

KEYCOMM recently welcomed Therapy Box, a leading developer/supplier of ipad apps and accessories to Edinburgh to demonstrate their products in early October. They demonstrated Predictable, their text based app and Scene and Heard, a communication app based around the use of visual scenes,. They also demonstrated Assistiveware's Proloquo2Go which we will look at later in the newsletter.

Predictable, they described as a lightwriter for the ipad, has many features that can offer flexibility in its access. With the latest version, which is due to be released soon, the keyboard can be completely reorganised. There is also the option of using handwriting recognition for people who prefer to write rather type. Predictable also has a scanning option, and the screen can be used as a switch. A switch and blue tooth switch box can alternatively be used.

Scene and Heard, had the wow factor, which we can't do justice to here. It is basically a visual scene app, however, the visual scenes can be used for many purposes in addition to use for expressive language. For instance, scenes can be sequenced to show someone how to make a cup of tea, video clips of each step can be included as well as the auditory prompt. Scenes can be scheduled to begin automatically at times during the day, eg within a school setting, the maths scenes might open up at 9.30, and the snack apps at 10.15am. So there is a huge potential for use of this app for receptive language and learning.


New website

Cleaning Policy

We have recently updated our guidelines on how to look after and maintain our equipment whilst it is out on loan. The equipment within our loan bank can be loaned to many people and we want everyone to feel that they are getting to trial a device that looks and behaves as good as new. So you can help us by following these guidelines.

- 1) If you are supplied with a protective case or cover for the device on loan, please keep this in place throughout the loan period.
- 2) Please keep all attachments, documents and/or instructions together, ready to be returned with the equipment.
- 3) Please do not remove or cover Keycomm ID reference numbers
- 4) To clean non-porous equipment, please ONLY use antibacterial disposable wipes. We recommend that they are 60-70% alcohol based wipes.
- 5) Please remove any personal stickers from equipment before returning to Keycomm.

Voice Amplifiers

We have recently updated our referral process for the voice amplifier service. There are two ways the service can be accessed. As a speech and language therapist you can choose to borrow a voice amplifier from Keycomm to try with your client, alternatively the client can self-refer to Keycomm. We have introduced a short referral form which can be found on our website. This needs to be completed before an assessment can be arranged, and there is a short section that must be completed by the speech and language therapist. All clients referred will be assessed at Keycomm

Support Clinic Sessions

New Monthly Support Clinics at KEYCOMM

We are now able to offer a monthly clinic at the KEYCOMM centre to support and review individual's AAC system. This is, initially available to individuals who are 16 years and older and not in full time education. The clinic will start in November and will be held on the second Thursday of each month between 10am and 2.30pm. Each individual must make an appointment to attend the clinic, and each appointment will be one hour long. During the clinic we will be able to review the present AAC system or provide support and /or training for a key person who should accompany the individual user. The next clinic dates are;



Proloquo2Go version 2

Proloquo2Go has been around for a quite a while now and Assistiveware

have continually made small improvements to the software, however, this

summer saw a major update to the software. A few new features have been

added, and the vocabulary set has been completely rejigged.

Proloquo2Go now has 3 vocabulary options. You can start from blank and access their symbol banks, begin with the basic vocabulary set or start with the core vocabulary set, which is designed so that the individual can build their own phrases from single words. All of the vocabulary sets are targeted towards children. There continues to be the option of using the keyboard to write messages as well. The keyboard has prediction.

Programming has changed, and takes a bit to get used to if you are familiar with the older version of Proloquo2Go. We have created instructions for this, and uploaded them to our new website. You will can find these on the downloads page at www.keycomm.weebly.com . Once you do become more familiar with Proloqu2Go, programming becomes a very quick process.

There are some nice features that have been added. You can now hide buttons, and swap them more easily. You can select a number of buttons to edit at once. Individual buttons can also have individual styles.

If you already have the older version of Proloquo2Go, a free upgrade to version 2 is available through itunes.





In the latest software upgrade for the ipad (IOS 1.06), Apple have added an interesting accessibility option that everyone has been asking for for a while.

Yes, it is finally here! The ipad can be locked into apps. This means that if Proloquo2Go, or any other app seems like the perfect app, but the user finds other aspects of the ipad more interesting, the ipad can now be locked in to the app, meaning that the user is only able to use that app.

You will find this option in the settings. It is called guided access, and it will require a pincode to unlock it once it is set.

This course is suitable for Speech and Language Therapists, and Teachers. USING IPADS IN AAC - ACIP's annual study day
