Text to Speech AAC Options

There are various options for individuals who require a text



to speech communication aid. The Lightwriter sl40 can be a very good option as it has real keys and the keyboard can be modified for

sensitivity. It also comes with 3 different keyguards for varied access. The Lightwriter can also be used as a mobile phone for text messaging if the individual finds traditional mobile phones difficult to access. Another good option is the

Allora voice output communication aid sold by Techcess. This has a qwerty keyboard but also can be used with single switch scanning for those individuals who need to switch between direct and indirect access. It also



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has a listener screen which detaches so the communication partner can take it with them around the house. It is a bit bulkier than the Lightwriter but some of our clients have preferred this device.

The other text to speech options are on the Ipad. There are various apps which support text to speech which we have used with good results. Speak it! and Predictable are the most commonly used with Speak it! being the simplest to use. There are a few others you might want to check out. ClaroCom is a free app that also gives the individual a qwerty keyboard and pre-stored phrases. It also supports word and phrase prediction and there are various settings you can use to individualise the speech and appearance of the app. This is a free app which has lots of features. We have already discussed Proloquo4text in our last newsletter. This app can be very busy on the screen but it does support dual language speakers. It is produced by the same app developer as Proloquo2go.









Scottish Government News

Predictable app Update

The Predictable app from Therapy Box has now been updated to Predictable 5. It looks quite different, behaves differently and has some new

features. The first thing you notice is the icons on the right hand of the screen have changed. They are the same features just with a new look. One of the new features is Floor hold. This is a pre-set phrase that the user can programme which will speak out while you are typing your message to let your communication partner know you are composing your message. Some sample messages might be "Please wait a minute" or "please bear with me while I type my message". Predictable now also has a variety of keyboards to choose from. Another new feature it now has is the option of having in line prediction in a speech bubble or



prediction in boxes above the keyboard or both. The new version 5 also gives you the option of having your phrases in a list or grid format. For more information, have a look at the therapy box website. *www.therapybox.co.uk*

Something new

The Swifty USB Switch Interface Box for windows devices brings switch input to the devices where the software has the capability. This can be used on the Tobii Dynavox T series as well as the SmartBox Grid pad series of devices. Available from Liberator Ltd.

In order to get the Swifty to work, you must change the white dip switch configuration to dip switch 2 down and positions 1, 3, and 4 up.
